Community Action Plan: Shared Priorities On-going



The Snake Valley Community

Snake Valley sits in the Shire of Pyrenees located 27 kilometres west of Ballarat and 153 kilometres west of Melbourne. The Snake Valley district derives benefits of a quiet rural setting while still accessing the facilities of large city.

The Carringum balug clan of the Wathaurong are the traditional land owners of the Snake Valley/ Carngham district. White settlement began in 1838 at the Aboriginal hunting ground known as Kurnam (later Carngham) and boomed during the gold rush of 1857. Once the district had close to 10,000 white settlers, four hotels and a casino plus numerous shops, trades people and other agricultural enterprises. The Historical Society's

publications give an insightful picture of the lives and activities of the district.

The 2011 census recorded 587 persons in Snake Valley township. The local economy is of an agricultural nature with broad acre farming, grazing and timber industries dominating.

Residents demonstrate an attachment to their area with a diverse number of active community groups providing a range of social activities.

The town is serviced by a general store, the Royal Hotel and the Community Hall. Snake Valley sports clubs include football, netball and cricket teams as well as a 9 hole golf course.

Woady Yaloak Primary School provides the first level of education to the town. There are three churches. The Uniting Church's bluestone structure with it's historic pipe organ is a significant asset to the town; with a striking silhouette visible along a key town entrance.

With our clear, dark skies Snake Valley also boasts The Snake Valley Astronomical Association. Their work and Astronomy Camps attract international attention and guests.

Natural assets include Mag Dam and Dawson Dam. Significant patches of native vegetation, including wildflowers, are present on both public and private properties.







Town Demographics

The 2011 Census recorded 587 persons in Snake Valley

Snake Valley's average age is 6 years higher than the Victorian average. It has a high percentage of Australian born persons. The median incomes are comparatively low, however mortgages and rent are also lower and 51.1% of homes are fully owned. Technicians and trade workers and Labourers are the primary occupations.

- 26.6% of people were attending an educational institution. Of these,
 28.7% were in primary school,
 29.3% in secondary school and
 10.8% in a tertiary or technical institution.
- Of people aged 15 years and over, 45.3% were married and 17.8% were either divorced or separated
- Of all households, 69.0% were family households, 25.0% were single person households and 6.0% were group households.
- 31.2% of occupied private dwellings had one registered motor vehicle garaged or parked at their address, 40.3% had two registered motor vehicles and 24.7% had three or more registered motor vehicles.
