

# INTRODUCTION

## "Our Community"

The residents of Natte Yallock enjoy and thrive on our idyllic, rural, farming lifestyle, treasure the tenacity of our forebears and the history of our district, marvel at the beauty and power of our riverside environment, value the thoughts and ideals of our many community groups, and rejoice at the friendships formed amongst our tight-knit community.

Our vision for the future is to continue the work of our forefathers to ensure that the community of Natte Yallock continues to exist on Big Water - Little Plain for many years to come and is serviced and supported by federal, state and local governments and a caring community.

The Natte Yallock Community is a small, rural community that covers a large geographical area represented by mainly farming families. We have a stable population with the majority of families having lived in the area over a long period of time. We have many active groups/clubs in the community including Landcare, Primary School, Football and Netball Club, Tennis Club, Cricket Club, CFA and Recreation Reserve Committee, Cemetery Trust with most community members involved in several groups. Our Football and Netball Club is amalgamated with the township of Bealiba.



We are a very supportive community and very active in advancing our communities' best interests. We have updated our Recreation Reserve Complex facilities (1999) and replaced our ageing public amenities (2006-7). In 2008 we received a Water Grant to install two 5000gal, an 1800 gal tank and improve ground water problems by connecting downpipes to the new tanks.

In 2012 a bore was also sunk on the reserve and a storage tank installed. The bore water is very salty but there is access to water in case of emergency or for stock. We now have access to a bore that provides good quality water to water the oval following the installation of watering system and reseeding of oval. Two new tanks were provided by landcare and have been installed to hold the water for watering purposes. It's great to see green grass on the oval for most of the year! Flood Recovery funding in 2012-13 enabled the community to plan for the future by upgrading the power to the Reserve, redesign the current football/netball changerooms, resurface netball courts and address drainage issues. In 2013-14 we received further funding to commence Stage 2 renovations at the complex & these were completed 2014.

Funding from DELWP in 2015 has also enabled us to improve drainage in the carpark area, seal the space between the building and courts and install a path infront of the complex and bollards have been installed to designate parking areas and provide emergency access.

Funding from the Pyrenees Shire Community Grant Program in 2016 enabled the committee to install safety bollards in the carpark to create emergency vehicle access.

The Reserve is an important part of Natte Yallock as it is the hub of the community and most of the community celebrations or activities are conducted at the Recreation Reserve.

We are also very proud of our school, which has received high recognition for its programs particularly with information technology and with environmental issues.

Our football/netball club amalgamated with neighboring Bealiba in 1962 and has a proud history of bring a strong family orientated club. In 2011 the club joined the Maryborough and Castlemaine District Football/Netball League as the Lexton Plains League disbanded in 2010. Both the senior football and netball teams played in the finals series in 2016.



In September 2010 (in excess of 77ml) and again in January 2011( 200ml) the community of Natte Yallock was impacted upon by arguably the biggest floods since 1956. Two homes were inundated and many kilometers of fencing were washed away or damaged. The Pyrenees Shire Council was quick to provide assistance for the residents and the shire representatives co-ordinated the large team of volunteers who donated their time to help the residents begin the massive task of Flood Recovery. The community of Natte Yallock and district is forever grateful for the assistance it received from the volunteers and for their friendship.

During the year the community was successful with Flood Recovery funding to host an event to bring the community together and thank the many volunteers for their support.

A Flood Recovery book "Reflections" pictorially recorded the flood for future generations and was unveiled at the celebratory dinner which was held in October 2011.

The community again experienced major flooding when the Avoca River broke its banks twice in September 2016. The practice cricket wicket received considerable damage, the air conditioners and pump were deemed unrepairable, and the oval is being monitored. The playgroup softfall will need to be replaced. The interior of the complex was luckily not impacted. The school yard was flooded however the water did not enter the building. Farming land was severely impacted once again, fencing damaged and crops damaged.

### **Population** – 2016 Census figures not available yet


In the 2006 Census, there were 188 persons usually resident in Natte Yallock (Suburb): 52.1% were males and 47.9% were females.

People and growth: In the 2006 Census 16.5% of the population usually resident in Natte Yallock (Suburb) were children aged between 0-14 years, and 37.8% were persons aged 55 years and over. Median age: 44 years, compared with 37 years in Australia Age groups: 0-4 years 6; 5-14 years 25; 15-24 years 21; 25-54 years 64; 55-64 years 33; 65 years and over 38 Median age of persons 44 years

Household characteristics: In the 2006 Census there were 72 occupied private dwellings counted in Natte Yallock (Suburb): 100.0% were separate houses.

In the 2006 Census, there were 56 families in Natte Yallock (Suburb): 42.9% were couple families with children, 39.3% were couple families without children, 10.7% were one parent families and 7.1% were other families.

# History



Owing to the abundance of food and water in the district the aboriginal tribes in the area were physically well developed and were peaceful tribes with some of the young men being trained as horsemen and stockmen. Members of the tribe were still in the district around the turn of the century.

The first European settlers arrived in the early 1840's with the 'Rathscar Run' extending from Avoca to Bealiba on both sides of the Avoca River. In 1848 the Run was divided into Nettyallock, east of the river and Moyriesk and Green Hills, west of the river.

In 1854 Nettyallock was divided into Natte Yallock and Archdale. Many of the early farmers tilled the land to provide food for the influx of miners in the 1850's.

With the discovery of gold in the region there was a great influx of people searching for gold, however as the 'golden years' came to an end from 1851 - 1861 there was much interest in


obtaining freehold land in order to settle down as farmers.

Floods have been an ongoing problem for the farmers who settled along the Avoca River & the 2 disastrous floods in 1870 justified the naming of Natte Yallock – "Big Water – Little Plain".

# **Geographic Location**

Natte Yallock is a small rural town in the Australian state of Victoria. Natte Yallock is located in the Pyrenees Shire local government area, 200 kilometres (120 miles) north west of the state capital, Melbourne and 90 kilometres (56 miles) from the regional cities of Bendigo and Ballarat.

# What we love about our Community

**Strengths:** We are small, tight-knit, farming community that prides itself on working together for the betterment of the community. We rely on community members to provide many hours of volunteer labour and use of their own equipment, including transporting of it, to maintain our community areas. Many of the projects completed at the reserve have been built and maintained by a wonderful group of volunteers, including the upgrade of the complex in 2000 (a team of 3-4 volunteers worked with the builder every day) and the recent building of toilets and installation of rain water tanks.

Most of the town's infrastructure is based at the Recreation Reserve and it is the hub of the community. This is a benefit to the community as it has one area to maintain. The relocation of the CFA shed to the Reserve is being considered, especially as the Reserve is the designated Safer Place for the community.



Our school is a focal point of the town and the community is proud of the children's achievements. The school has has received high recognition for its programs particularly with information technology and with environmental issues. The students have presented and participated in international conferences (e.g. International River Health Conference, Canberra). The school was an integral member of the Leading Practice Program and had many visiting schools from metropolitan and country areas. A key focus at the school is Leadership and many students from our small school have also gone onto leadership roles at secondary school.

The children have been competing in the RACV Energy Breakthrough for several years with great success.

We have a strong, well-regarded Landcare Group that not only supports the river and natural g forums and workshops that support the farming community.

environment but also actively organizes farming forums and workshops that support the farming community.

## **Challenges:**



- Being situated along the Avoca River, the threat of floods is always in the back of our minds.

- Our community members live and work in three different shires, (Pyrenees, Central Goldfields and Northern Grampians), which can make applying for grants for maintenance/development of our community difficult at times

- We are situated at the northern edge of the Pyrenees Shire
- Maintaining numbers of children at the Primary School.

- Retaining youth in the district. Many of the young farmers no longer live on the family and prefer to live in larger centres and travel to work at the farm.

**Opportunities:** With current Flood Recovery work being carried out there is a great opportunity to fix problems that have been neglected for many years. Regular communication with the Shire Council officers over the last 4 years has enabled the community to express its vision for the future and enabled Council to access funds for major upgrades at the Reserve and in the Natte Yallock district.

While the flood caused major damage to the town and had a devastating effect on the farming community, the funding that has been made available has enabled the community to repair the damage and upgrade the infrastructure for the future.

### **Common values and attributes:**

We want continued success for our clubs/groups, especially within the primary school (to maintain high student numbers) and football/netball clubs (with adequate player numbers and social support that the club provides as well as some onfield success). We would like to see continued upgrading of our community facilities and better communication with the shire to help facilitate this. Any support we can access that will make it easier for families to maintain their connection with the community and its sporting /social network would be appreciated. While each group has their individual "wish list" there are some major issues that need addressing for the betterment of all the community.

### Successful projects in 2016-17

- 1. **Replace Natte Coach's Box** with possible 2 storey style. Grant successful in 2015 and work has commenced on construction- to be in place by start or 2017 season
- 2. Air Conditioning in the kitchen to improve working conditions & reduce power consumption and stress on fridges
- 3. Entrance foyer- investigate options for decorating the foyer to reflect the history of the district and community Table/Dresser for foyer made from hall timber

Restoration of hall seats

- 4. Emergencies Happen Project: follow up session in late 2015
- 5. Seat from the hall was restored and has plaque noting its significance

Also floor boards from the hall we used to make a frame for a mirror which is now located in the foyer along with a sideboard. These were made by the Maryborough Men's Shed. Historic hall photos are also displayed

## "Farewell to the Hall"

In early 2016, after consultation with the community, the committee voted to apply for permits from DELWP and the Pyrenees Shire to demolish the Community Hall as it had fallen into disrepair and was no longer being used due to the major renovations to the Community Complex. Funding was obtained from DELWP to assist with the demolition and work commenced in August. The site will be cleared by the end of the year and this will make way for the possible relocation of the Natte Yallock Fire Shed to the Recreation Reserve.





Prior to work commencing, the committee invited members of the Natte Yallock (& district) community to attend a "Farewell to the Hall" function on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> June, some 81 years after the hall was built by Mr C Astbury and Mr Henry Streeter, with help from the community. The function was well attended (50+) and the afternoon commenced with a group photo infront of the hall. The gathering them moved to the complex and Alan Streeter and Pauline Coates welcomed guests and outilined the history of the hall.

There was much reminiscing, old photos shared, a cup of tea in the old hall cups, and an opportunity to raise funds to have the old seats from the hall restored.

**Our Vision:** To improve the reserve in a sustainable manner to meet current and future needs and expectations of the community.

## Our Planning Process - CAP for 2015-2020 was reviewed and updated in October 2017



The initial draft for the Community Action Plan was started at our first meeting on 9<sup>th</sup> of March 2005 and it was reviewed and up dated in January 2009.

Present at these initial meeting were representatives from most user groups and organisations from the broader community.

In mid 2011 the Pyrenees Shire Council engaged SGL Consulting Group to prepare the master plan with input from Council, the Natte Yallock Recreation Reserve Committee of Management, and the broader Natte Yallock community. 30 community members attended and it was a valuable session with many varied of ideas and opinions presented throughout the session. The master plan has been prepared and presented to the Shire and the community. 2012-13 Update: As there will be major works carried over the next few months we will not

know what actions haven't been met or what we require for the future until next year.

2015-16 Update: In September members of the NYRR Committee of Management met with user groups and representatives from the Cemetery Trust and School to review the CAP for the next 5 years. In Nove mber 2015 the committee acknowledged the valuable support of previous committee members who have volunteered their services over the last 25 years at a celebratory dinner.

The 2017-18 review of the CAP was held in October 2017 and plans for the coming year/s are listed below

## Priorities for 2017-18

Reserve

- 1. Replace Scoreboard damaged during flood- grant in pending
- 2. Spinaways in the changerooms, showers, toilets, storeroom to alleviate moisture/ mould /damage to timber work & plaster this issue was not resolved during stage 2 renovations. Rec Reserve committee to do
- 3. Fenced area for the rubbish bins Rec Reserve committee to do
- 4. Kitchen upgrade (no funding left after the stage 2 upgrade) is a high priority as the facilities are used during the football/netball season after training and home games. The club also caters for funerals, family functions and training sessions and it is the Safer Place for Natte Yallock in case of emergency
  - a) Stainless steel splashbacks and benches
  - b) Commercial dishwasher
  - c) Deeper sink
  - d)Canopy / Exhaust fan system

e)Relocate cupboards in the kitchen and investigate options for drawers instead of cupboards.

- 5. Upgrade the side delivery door access, replace the door and lock and install verandah/cover over the door to protect the access
- 6. New catch nets behind the goals at both ends of the oval.
- 7. Airconditioner for dining area- this was not covered in Stage 2 project due to lack of funding
- 8. Shade structure over the playground- Grant available- not successful
- 9. Watering the Oval: work with Shire to discuss options for acquiring water for the oval. Currently using bore on private land
- 10. Public Toilet situation- cleaning and supplies.

### Town

- 1. Parking on the roadside near the cemetery is dangerous- need to investigate safer option Also seating and shelter at the cemetery
- 2. Town stone walls we never received these and it was suggested that we could use the funds for something more important at the Reserve but this never eventuated- investigate possibility of this to assist with kitchen upgrade
- 3. Mowing of grass in the town zone
- 4. Liaise with the SES to establish a communication system- this never happened
- 5. Drainage issues on road behind the school that leads to Moonambel- corner Mills Rd. This was discussed with Council after the 2011 floods but there were not enough funds to address the community's concerns.
- 6. Street Light outside Rec Reserve- this used to shine into the carpark area and provided light when patrons were leaving the complex. This has been redirected and shines onto empty street.
