REMINDER: Primary Producer Grants closing soon

The Primary Producer Flood Recovery Grant is a payment of up to \$75,000 to primary producers directly affected by the floods and storms to help with clean up, re-establish properties, and get businesses up and running again.

This grant covers activities like the removal and disposal of debris and injured or dead livestock, replacing or repairing essential equipment, fixing and replacing fencing, buying fodder, water and water storage, salvaging damaged crops, grain or feed, and hiring or purchasing materials to clean up a property or equipment.

Applications must be submitted by 4pm on **30 April 2023**. Please contact Rural Finance on <u>1800 260 425</u> if you need any help with the application or have any questions.

Flood Inquiry

Victoria's major floods of October 2022 are subject to a parliamentary inquiry. The Legislative Council Environment and Planning Committee will investigate the state's preparedness for and response to the disaster and is calling for public submissions on a number of items such as:

- Causes of and contributions to the flood event;
- Adequacy and effectiveness of early warning systems;
- Resourcing of SES;
- Flood event as a whole including catchments and floodplains; plus more.

WHAT'S COMING UP?

Infrastructure Repair Update

So far \$7M worth of repairs on infrastructure such as roads, bridges and culverts has been identified. Council is required to submit applications to the State Government for funding approval to fix the infrastructure. Works have been prioritised based on the severity of the damage and the amount of traffic that uses the road. We know there are many roads in the Pyrenees that need repair work and we thank you, the community, for your patience and ask that you drive safely. We'll keep you up to date with where works are happening and what works will be coming up.

The first approved application was for pavement repairs on sealed roads as they are higher trafficked roads. Repairs will commence soon on the following roads:

- Lexton Ararat Road
- Landsborough Elmhurst Road
- Moonambel Natte Yallock Road
- Beaufort Waubra Road
- Waubra Talbot Road
- Homebush Road
- Park Road
- Raglan Elmhurst Road
- Nunns Road
- Back Amphitheatre Road
- Beaufort Carngham Road
- Barkly Navarre Road
- Landsborough Stawell Road
- Frenchmans Navarre Road



A second application has also been approved to repair rutting on road shoulders. Vehicles travel at higher speeds on these roads and have to move to the edge to pass another vehicle as the seal is narrower.

Contact from Windermere

Windermere Services, on behalf of Council, has been contacting affected residents in the Pyrenees to see how they are going after the flood events and to see if any support is needed. Windermere case support workers have been providing referral services such as accommodation, cleanup, helping to understand available payments, as well as wellbeing support and financial counselling.

Secondary Impact Assessments (SIAs)

A1 has been engaged through Emergency Recovery Victoria (ERV) to coordinate Secondary Impact Assessments on behalf of Council. SIAs are an assessment of the impact of the flood on the natural, built, social and economic environments. Assessments are done by building surveyors, environmental health officers and structural engineers on resident's homes and community facilities. BlazeAid and Landmate

Waste pick-up

If you still have flood damaged carpets, whitegoods, furniture or sandbags that need collecting, call Council to organise collection. No general household waste, building materials or hazardous materials such as asbestos will be picked up. You can call Council to find out how to dispose of these items.

CALL FOR COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES

Expressions of Interest (EOIs) are still open if you would like to be part of the Municipal Recovery Coordination Committee. This Committee will run for the length of time that recovery activities are needed, as per the Flood Recovery Plan. Community-led recovery is really important to ensure communities build back stronger and more resilient.

If you are interested in being a part of recovery planning, an Expression of Interest to join the Municipal Recovery Coordination Committee has been advertised. - Set realistic goals that keep you motivated, but don't take on too much.
- Talk about how you feel (the ups and downs) with friends, family and health professionals, when you are ready.
